


Luke 8:15 (ESV) 15 As for that in the good soil, they are those who, hearing the word, hold it fast in an honest and good heart, and bear fruit with patience.



Job 1:1: There was a man in the land of Uz whose name was Job, and that man was blameless and upright, one who feared God and turned away from evil.



Job 1:5 And when the days of the feast had run their course, Job would send and consecrate them, and he would rise early in the morning and offer burnt offerings according to the number of them all. For Job said, "It may be that my children have sinned, and cursed God in their hearts." Thus Job did continually.



Job 1:8-12 (ESV) 8 And the Lord said to Satan, "Have you considered my servant Job, that there is none like him on the earth, a blameless and upright man, who fears God and turns away from evil?"

You have **blessed** the work of his hands, and his possessions have increased in the land. But stretch out your hand and touch all that he has, and **he will** curse you to your face.

Job 1:9-12 (ESV) 9 Then Satan answered the Lord and said, "Does Job fear God for no reason? 10 Have you not put a hedge around him and his house and all that he has, on every side? You have blessed the work of his hands, and his possessions have increased in the land. 11 But stretch out your hand and touch all that he has, and he will curse you to your face." 12 And the Lord said to Satan, "Behold, all that he has is in your hand. Only against him do not stretch out your hand." So Satan went out from the presence of the Lord.

Does Job fear God for no reason? Have you not put a **hedge** around him and his house and all that he has, on every side? You have **blessed** the work of his hands, and his possessions have increased in the land. But stretch out your hand and touch all that he has, and **he will** curse you to your face.

- Satan's accusation is that Job is only faithful and serving God because it benefits him in this life. God protects him, blesses him, and gives to him.
- Satan's challenge is that if all those benefits go away, Job will not only stop fearing God, he will turn away from God and blame God for all that goes wrong.

Does Job fear God for no reason? Have you not put a **hedge** around him and his house and all that he has, on every side? You have **blessed** the work of his hands, and his possessions have increased in the land. But stretch out your hand and touch all that he has, and **he will** curse you to your face.

- This is the essence of the problem with suffering and pain in this life, especially for those who are believers and followers of God.
- We want to think that as His followers, everything will always be good and we will always be blessed richly in this life.
 - But we also see the reality all around us, and often very personally.

Does Job fear God for no reason? Have you not put a **hedge** around him and his house and all that he has, on every side? You have **blessed** the work of his hands, and his possessions have increased in the land. But stretch out your hand and touch all that he has, and **he will** curse you to your face.


- Was God punishing Job?
 - Clearly not.
 - What does it say about us that our thoughts turn to thinking God is punishing us if we don't get everything we want, or if life becomes difficult?
 - How shallow is our faith? (Just like Satan?)

Does Job fear God for no reason? Have you not put a **hedge** around him and his house and all that he has, on every side? You have **blessed** the work of his hands, and his possessions have increased in the land. But stretch out your hand and touch all that he has, and **he will** curse you to your face.

- Doesn't it seem that God is bragging on Job?
 - God is so convinced of his faith that he's the proof that Satan's accusation is untrue.
 - God has put his own reputation on the line with Job. He completely trusts in Job's faith!

Does Job fear God for no reason? Have you not put a **hedge** around him and his house and all that he has, on every side? You have **blessed** the work of his hands, and his possessions have increased in the land. But stretch out your hand and touch all that he has, and **he will** curse you to your face.

- Is God just "using" Job, though? Is he merely a pawn in a game between Jehovah and Satan?
- Will Job get any benefit from going through all this suffering?
 - Is God actually doing this for Job's benefit too?
 - How will this help Job's faith?




Job 1:20-22 (ESV) 20 Then Job arose and tore his robe and shaved his head and fell on the ground and worshiped. 21 And he said, "Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked shall I return. The Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord." 22 In all this Job did not sin or charge God with wrong.

Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked shall I return. Jehovah gave, and Jehovah has taken away; blessed be the name of Jehovah.

- This is the opposite of Satan's expectation!
- This is exactly what Jehovah expected!



Job 2:3-6 (ESV) 3 And the Lord said to Satan, "Have you considered my servant Job, that there is none like him on the earth, a blameless and upright man, who fears God and turns away from evil? He still holds fast his integrity, although you incited me against him to destroy him without reason." 4 Then Satan answered the Lord and said, "Skin for skin! All that a man has he will give for his life. 5 But stretch out your hand and touch his bone and his flesh, and he will curse you to your face." 6 And the Lord said to Satan, "Behold, he is in your hand; only spare his life."






- Jehovah praises Job's continuing integrity.
- Satan, incredibly, argues that Job didn't suffer enough (!!!).




Job 2:9-10 (ESV) 9 Then his wife said to him, "Do you still hold fast your integrity? **Curse God and die**." 10 But he said to her, "You speak as one of the foolish women would speak. Shall we receive good from God, and shall we not receive evil?" In all this Job did not sin with his lips.




- Again Job doesn't react as Satan expects. Why?
- And Job reacts as Jehovah expects.




- But...
 - It turns out it's not as simple as that in some ways.
 - As time passes, and nothing changes; learn that the test is not just in that moment.
- Job's friends come to comfort him; 7 days of silence
- Job speaks... hear his pain!




Job3:1 After this Job opened his mouth and cursed the day of his birth.








26 I am not at ease, nor am I quiet; I have no rest, but trouble comes."







Job 7:6-10 (ESV) **My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle and come to their end without hope.** 7 "Remember that my life is a breath; **my eye will never again see good**. 8 The eye of him who sees me will behold me no more; while your eyes are on me, I shall be gone. 9 As the cloud fades and vanishes, so he who goes down to Sheol does not come up; 10 he returns no more to his house, nor does his place know him anymore.


Job 14:14 (ESV) 14 **If a man dies, shall he live again?** All the days of my service I would wait, till my renewal should come.


Job 17:1-2 (ESV) 1 "My spirit is broken; my days are extinct; the graveyard is ready for me.






Job 19:8-12 (ESV) 8 He has walled up my way, so that I cannot pass, and he has set darkness upon my paths.






5 I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you; 6 therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes."






⁻ 16 And after this Job lived 140 years, and saw his sons, and his sons' sons, four generations. 17 And Job died, an old man, and full of days.




James 5:10-11: As an example of suffering and patience, brothers, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord. **Behold, we consider those blessed who remained steadfast.** You have heard of the steadfastness of Job, and you have seen the purpose of the Lord, how the Lord is compassionate and merciful.




Job is given to us an example of a righteous man enduring great suffering.




- Purpose (KJV: the **end** of the Lord)
 - (CWSB Dictionary) (II) Figuratively it means end, event, issue, result (Matt. 26:58; James 5:11, the issue or event which the Lord gave).
 - (MED) final dealing, developed issue, Jas. 5:11
 - (TDNT Abridged) 1. To understand télos and teléō in the NT one must remember their dynamic character; they denote 'fulfilment' (cf. Lk. 22:37).



- The purpose of the Lord
 - Although Job didn't know at the time why he was suffering
 - And he struggled mightily to understand "Why?"
 - He resisted the false thoughts of His "friends" who did not speak right of God (42:8)




- Some possible purposes... (What end did God have in mind?)
 - A lesson for Satan?
 - but that seems manipulative and cruel
 - did Satan really need "proof" of God's power, love, majesty?
 - It has to be more!




A lesson for Job?


- Suffering endurance character hope God's love!
- Romans 5:3-5 (ESV) 3 Not only that, but we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, 4 and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, 5 and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us.




- Job 42:5-6 (ESV) 5 I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but **now my eye sees you**; 6 therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes."
- Same lesson for us!!!




- This is often where we fail in understanding suffering.
- Our tendency is to feel forsaken, and that no good will ever happen (Just like Job)
 - Curse our birth.
 - Wish for death.




- Need someone to hear us....
 - His friends didn't really listen nor comfort.
 - His wife rejected him.
 - God won't answer.
 - Job 31:35 (ESV) 35 Oh, that I had one to hear me! (Here is my signature! Let the Almighty answer me!) Oh, that I had the indictment written by my adversary!




- In the midst of suffering, it's easy to forget God's love!
 - Job 42:8 And my servant Job shall pray for you, for I will accept his prayer not to deal with you according to your folly ... and the Lord accepted Job's prayer.



- 10 And the Lord restored the fortunes of Job, when he had prayed for his friends.
- And the Lord gave Job twice as much as he had before.
- 12 And the Lord blessed the latter days of Job more than his beginning.




⁻ 16 And after this Job lived 140 years, and saw his sons, and his sons' sons, four generations. 17 And Job died, an old man, and full of days.



Job's steadfastness

- Doesn't mean that we don't ask questions.
- Doesn't mean that we don't challenge God.
- Doesn't mean that we don't squirm, whine, bemoan.
- Doesn't mean that we don't stop thinking.
- Suffering is a struggle: physically, emotionally, mentally, spiritually




Steadfastness

- We keep our faith in God.
- We keep drawing nearer to Him.



2 Corinthians 4:16-18 (ESV) 16 So we do not lose heart. Though our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. 17 For this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, 18 as we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen. For the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal.



- You may be suffering today.
 - Financial, health, emotional, mental
- It may have just started ... or it may have been going on for a long time.
- Be steadfast
 - brethren to help (hopefully the right way)
 - consider the purpose of God
 - look to God with hope knowing that He loves you and is compassionate and merciful.

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Go On to Steadfast Hope - Job's Steadfastness

Job & James 5:10-11

<u>Synopsis:</u> Job provides a wonderful example of how a mature righteous man endures suffering. James summarizes the lessons to be learned from Job. We must remember the Purpose of God; and we must remember the compassion and mercy of God.

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"Let all that you do be done with love."
