



- · Previous lessons: God is in the business of forgiveness.
 - Psalms 103:1-5 (ESV) 1 Bless the LORD, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name! 2 Bless the LORD, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits, 3 who forgives all your iniquity, who heals all your diseases, 4 who redeems your life from the pit, who crowns you with steadfast love and mercy, 5 who satisfies you with good so that your youth is renewed like the eagle's.




- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ Since we are to be like God, we also must be in the business of forgiving.
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ But we also learned in last lesson that God doesn't always forgive!
 - · Moses knew that Jehovah might not forgive the people of Israel for their great sin of making the Golden Calf at Mt. Sinai.
 - · Moses warned that God would not forgive idolatry before they entered the promised land




- · Joshua reminded them of the same thing before he died.
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ Jeremiah in lamentations bold asserts that Jehovah had not forgiven them.




· One of our great struggles with forgiving those who hurt us is the anger for what they have done.




- · Story of Jonah
 - \cdot Jonah experiences the wrath of God for disobedience
 - $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ and the grace of God that saves




- · Reluctant to Forgive: Warning from Jonah
 - Jonah 4:1-4 (ESV) 1 But it displeased Jonah exceedingly, and he was angry. 2 And he prayed to the LORD and said, "O LORD, is not this what I said when I was yet in my country? That is why I made haste to flee to Tarshish; for I knew that you are a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love, and relenting from disaster. 3 Therefore now, O LORD, please take my life from me, for it is better for me to die than to live." 4 And the LORD said, "Do you do well to be angry?"



· Jonah 4:10-11 (ESV) 10 And the LORD said, "You pity the plant, for which you did not labor, nor did you make it grow, which came into being in a night and perished in a night. 11 And should not I pity Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than 120,000 persons who do not know their right hand from their left, and also much cattle?"




- · The wicked behavior of the Assyrians against the people of Israel was horrific
 - · Although, it was largely due to the idolatry of the Israelites and God's way of punishing their sins and trying to get them to turn back to Him in faithfulness.
- · When told to go preach that destruction was coming to this wicked people and that they needed to repent, Jonah refused.
 - · I infer there were some deep seated prejudices and hatred against Assyria because of the atrocities against Israel.




- Eventually he does go, is wildly successful, and the Assyrians repent and God relents from the disaster.
 - · It seems Jonah had really been hoping they would not repent.
 - $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ He had wanted a disaster to come against the Assyrians.




- · When they repented and God didn't destroy them, Jonah is angry.
 - · He knew the character of God: gracious, merciful, slow to anger, abounding in steadfast love, relenting from disaster
 - · Jonah wanted the disaster.
 - · Was Jonah angry at Assyria for repenting?
 - · Was Jonah angry at God for relenting?




- · Jehovah shows Jonah that PITY is superior to Anger.
 - · God was looking for a reason to be compassionate toward the Assyrians, so when they repented he "forgave" them (the word forgive is not in the text, but it is clearly implied to me).



- · Jonah was looking for a reason not to forgive the Assyrians
 - $\cdot\,$ So he didn't accept their repentance
 - · He wanted to be angry with them
 - · He refused to show pity
 - · Waiting for something bad to happen to them.
 - · Jonah didn't want them to be forgiven because he considered them his enemies.
 - · Not because it was in line with God's will for them.




Exodus 32:7-10 (ESV) 7 And the LORD said to Moses, "Go down, for your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have corrupted themselves. 8 They have turned aside quickly out of the way that I commanded them. They have made for themselves a golden calf and have worshiped it and sacrificed to it and said, 'These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!'" 9 And the LORD said to Moses, "I have seen this people, and behold, it is a stiff-necked people. 10 Now therefore let me alone, that my wrath may burn hot against them and I may consume them, in order that I may make a great nation of you."




Anger, wrath is real

How do we cope with it?


Hold on, strike out, let it eat at us?




- · Here is clearly a danger for us when we've been sinned against.
 - $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ Sometimes we are hurt so deeply that we are moved by anger not pity.
 - $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ We refuse to acknowledge that repentance is genuine.
 - · We convince ourselves that we are right to hold onto our anger
 - $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ We wait for something bad to happen to them.



- \cdot Jonah and I need to learn that when someone repents, our response needs to be pity
 - · because that is how God is.
- But God had gone further than that
 - · We see his pity because he sends Jonah to warn them (God doesn't just wipe them of the face of the earth without warning)
 - · God's pity was there all along.



Hosea 11:1-9



- · Jonah warns us against letting our anger, hatred, hurt, prejudices to keep us from being compassionate.
 - · Be compassionate by offering help to make things right.
 - $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ Give them a chance to repent
 - · Teach them, admonition them compassionately (firmly)
 - If they do repent ... then I need to forgive:
 - · let go of the anger
 - · embrace compassion.




- · Forgiveness is just the beginning of the process in restoring a relationship
